OHV / ATV Safety

What is an ORV / ATV?

- Off-highway Vehicles or OHV is a motor driven, off-road recreational vehicle capable of cross-country travel without the benefit of a road or trail. OHV's can travel over land, snow, ice, march, swampland, or other natural terrain. OHV's are multitrack or multi-wheel.
- All-Terrain Vehicle, ATV or also known as quads are motorized vehicles designed to drive off-road, dirt road, or trails.

What are some of the Risks?

- Steep hills / riding on the shoulders, can lead to a potential roll over
- Stunting or performing tricks
- * Riding in areas that are unknown or riding alone
- Losing control by driving to fast, washboard, uneven ground
- Riding at night or weather conditions
- Riding without safety gear
- Not maintaining the ORV or ATV

What can I do to be a safe rider?

- Obey posted signage
- Know the weather conditions & monitor throughout the day
- * Ride with someone / Pick a Route
- Ride during daylight hours
- Regularly inspect OHV / ATV & serviced
- Refer to manufacturer's manual Wear the required safety gear when riding
- Take an ATV operator course
- Keep the OHV's & ATV's clean of debris to prevent fire.
- In order to be compliant, an OHV / ATV requires insurance, registration and a license plate.
- Minimize sharp, low radius turns
- Respect private property and public land
- Leave all gates and fences as you find them

- 2) Under the Seat
- 3) Wheel Wells
- 4) Engine and Manifold
